MISSION GRANT PROGRAM

It is the purpose of this grant program to:

- 1. Encourage greater diversity among organizations involved in handbell ringing,
- 2. Enable organizations which require financial assistance to initiate, expand, or revitalize handbell/handchime programs.

Eligibility Requirements

Individuals interested in developing a handbell/handchime program for a community group, an educational institution, a group with special needs, a nursing home, a religious organization, or a retirement community are encouraged to apply.

Grants will be awarded as follows:

- 1. Non-Matching grants up to but not to exceed \$500 per grant will be awarded for the purchase or repair of handbells/handchimes.
- 2. Matching grants of \$501 but not to exceed \$1000 per grant will be awarded for the purchase or repair of handbells/handchimes.

The deadline for a grant application is January 1, 2003.

- 3. Describe the project for which you seek funding.
- 4. Prepare a budget and indicate the total amount you are requesting. In the budget, show any matching or additional financial or volunteer support your organization will be given toward this project.
- 5. If your organization is awarded this grant, what are your plans for the future funding of this project?
- 6. Please enclose a letter from the chief administrator verifying the financial need of your organization and the support of this project. Also express the willingness of your organization to submit a written evaluation of your project to the Area II Board one year from the date you receive the grant.
- 7. You may submit additional documents that support your project such as references that give more information about your work and purpose.

Special Notes

- 1. In addition to written evaluation and possible visitation by members of the Area II Board, Mission Grant awardees will be required to have a representative attend and participate in the classes and workshops at the Area II Festival Conference in the year of the award or another Area II event within 18 months from the date of the award.
- 2. Awardees will be required to have an official representative accept the award in public at the Area II Festival Conference Concert in the year of the award.

The Best and the Not-So-Good Fundraising I deas

Flowers or flour for cookies? Car wash or concert? Auction or Avon? Which will it be?

Choirs are busy raising money for their trip to the 2003 Area II Young Ringers' Festival and Festival Conference in Kutztown, PA. What are some great ideas which yield high profit for the hours invested in the fundraising project? A poll taken at the 2001 Festival Conference yielded many suggestions. It was noted that what was a great project for one group may turn out to be a poor idea for another group.

Each group needs to carefully plan the details of its fundraising project, gain approval of the church/organization officials, and carry out the project. An organized person who is good at handling details should head the project. The group should determine what they feel would be the best item(s) to offer for sale. Calculate the profit per item sold versus the hours expended to determine what your fundraising project will be.

One suggestion that has great merit is to select items to sell that people would otherwise purchase. Hanging baskets of flowers or bedding plants for Mother's Day, citrus fruit, or Christmas trees are examples of items that people would probably purchase. These would sell well since people know that they are helping their bell choir raise needed funds while they receive a product of good value which they would normally purchase at a local business.

Several ideas that yielded good profit for the hours expended were these:

Other fundraising ideas that yielded profits less than the choir hoped to raise were bake sales, church cook books, church luncheons, and magazine sales.


Remember to have fun with your choir members as you carry out the fundraising project. Bonding together as a group to successfully complete a project is important for any choir. Many changes have taken place at the National Office in recent months.

We have a new Executive Director. Jane Mary Tenhover began her tenure mid-June and has already made some significant changes in the way things are done in the Dayton office. Jane Mary has extensive experience working in non-profits and particularly in the area of fund raising.

Many of you have expressed your concern about the Participant's fee program. For some, it seemed like "taxation without representation." Many asked, "Why are we sending all this money to Dayton? What are we getting in return? "Actually, we (Area 2) always received a rebate on that money and the events had necessary ASCAP fees paid and received substantial insurance coverage.

What's different now? I know you want to hear that you do not have to pay the fees any longer but that would be a lie. The fees will still be "due" for your endorsed events and you will continue to receive the above benefits. The difference is that Area 2 will retain all the fees to support Area programming and Dayton will continue to provide us with insurance for our events and to do the paperwork for ASCAP clearance. Please continue to submit the forms to Dayton office <u>prior</u> to your events.

What's ahead? Sometime this fall we will have an election for a new President-Elect. At the same time, you will be asked to vote on some revisions to the National Bylaws. <u>If these revisions are approved</u>, the following changes will take place in the National Board. (This is not easy to condense. Please call or write to me if you have unanswered questions about this.)

The offices of Secretary and Finance Department Chair will no long exist.

The office of Area Representative to National will no longer exist.

Why these changes?

The Board spent long, arduous hours in the past year writing a document that will totally change the way in which the organization is operated. With this new governance policy, the Executive Director has a mandate to be the Chief Operating Officer and actually administer the organization. In the past, this has not been true. Sadly, AGEHR has not really operated as a business and we need to change that. By actually putting someone in charge of day-to-day operations, we will know "where the buck stops!" The Executive Director will be able to make many decisions that had to be made by others in the past. And the Executive Director will continue to be responsible to the Board of Directors.

If the Bylaw revisions pass, the new board will be comprised of five at-large members who will serve staggered six-year terms. Yes, this is a radical departure from our present board of 22 members. Remember that the operations of the Guild will be in the hands of the Executive Director who will call on others to help her do her job. The board's role will be very different.

As for the Areas being able to have representation... Jane Mary intends to establish an Advisory Council that will have Area representation. This will give the Areas direct contact with the Executive; a plan that should be more effective than in the past.

When your ballot arrives sometime this fall and you find yourself in a quandary about this, please call me or write if you need clarification on what is a very complex plan for change. All twelve Area Representatives voted to make these changes and essentially put ourselves out of our jobs because we believe strongly that the future of the AGEHR depends on a new plan of action from the top down.


