To Area 2 Membership:

The board is looking forward to meeting many of you at our upcoming Festival at SUNY Oswego. There is still time and opportunities to sign up for Tracks. The Saturday Educators Track is open to our registrants at no extra cost. But you must register for it by using the Educators' Track registration form that can be found on the Area 2 web site.

At the May 2013 Area 2 Board Meeting, we approved a **new organizational plan** for the Area 2 Board, effective October 1, 2013. The plan does not affect any of our By-laws, but distributes the duties of the board a bit differently. One item that may interest you is that the position of State Chairs is being eliminated. We are still looking for a Financial Advisor and will possibly be looking for a Legal Advisor.

Do you have ideas about how our **Biennial Festival** should be run? Here is your chance to help make it happen. We will now have a **Festival Committee**, the members of which do not have to be Area 2 Board members. The committee will report to the Past Chair. In addition, there are 2 performance tracks (copper and bronze), 2 directors' tracks (beginning and intermediate), a beginning ensemble track and beginning solo track.

Reading Sessions will be held for Advent/Christmas music, Level 3 & 4 music, The Liturgical Year (levels 1 and 2), Level 1 & 2 music, Level 2 & 3 music, and one for Secular music.

There will be maintenance classes for both Schulmerich and Malmark Bells.

Area 2 Festival 2013 Class Descriptions

Accessing and Using the Area and National Web Sites: Do you want to know what is happening in the bell world – area wide and nationally? Jill Fedon will help you in accessing the websites that will show you what there is to offer in the bell world. And, don't forget that we have an area 2 facebook page. You can find out how to become a friend to that site.

Assigning Bass Bells for easier ringing: Are you ringing in an intermediate/advanced choir? Are those Bass bell runs impossible? Joyce Easter of the Virginia Handbell Consort will work with you in assigning and arranging bass bells in order to overcome some of the difficulties.

Basic Bass Bell Techniques: Learn the proper techniques to handle the large bass bells without injury and how to play them effectively.

Bass Chimes from the 2nd octave: Some organizations have purchased the C2 – B2 chimes. These chimes must be carefully malleted and rung. Neil McDonald will give instruction on how to safely and effectively these instruments.

Bell Trees: The clinician will show you how to properly mallet a bell tree, how to arrange the bells, and give ideas on how to use them in a program or worship service.

Change Ringing on Petit a& Fritsen Bells: The Virginia Handbell Consort owns a set of Petit & Fritsen Bells. They are willing to share them with us for a day. Karen Simon, one of their ringers, will lead a class in change ringing on these unusual bells.

Composition class for ringers only: Doe a deer & Scooby do bah......Composition (for ringers only) Young ringers can be composers! We will start with some basic ideas and work to create music that ringers will play and take with them. Maximum limit for this class will be 20.

Copyright Law:. Area 2 advocates that all of its bell choirs adhere to the Copyright Laws. Bob Ward has been offering this class at most festivals. Come hear more about this law and how it affects you.

Directorless Ensembles: So, you want to ring as part of your choir! Or perhaps you are short ringers and it is necessary for you to ring. Bill Alexander rings as part of his StrikePoint choir and so has experience with this directorless ensemble. He will give you the ins and outs of directing from the ringers' side of the table.

Directors' Roundtable: This will be an opportunity to sit with other directors and share problems and discuss possible solutions. It is also a way to network and to get to know other directors.

Games and Community Building: Take a break! Spend a little time learning about each other in your group in a playful way and build the ringing community. This is an interactive class. Participants need to be willing to get up, move and be involved. Have a game that you play? Please share! Handbell Maintenance Classes: Two separate classes – one for Schullmerich Bells and one for Malmark Bells. These classes will give you instruction on adjusting and repairing the working parts of the bells.

Handbell Techniques on Handchimes: Some handbell techniques translate very well onto the chimes. Others do not. If you have chimes in your organization, start using them often. The sound is different and very appealing. Find out what you can and cannot do with this lovely instrument.

Leadership and Ringer Assessment for Developing Choirs: Directing a handbell choir requires more than waving one's hands in the air. This class will address some of those other issues.

Multiple Bell Techniques: Too many bells in front of you? My, oh, my. What do you do with them? A class that will have you working on weaving, changing, and sharing bells, etc.

Music Theory: An informational class that will introduce you to the theory of music in general. It will be presented by Martha Alford who is pursuing her Doctorate in the Music area.

"Musicality" and "Ringing Bronze Musically": Sure! You can count and you can clang those bells, play in rhythm, make percussive sounds! But how about making your ringing sound like music! Janet Van Valey is an excellent clinician to show you how to accomplish this. Pick the level best suited for you. If you are ringing Coppers and Tins, pick "Musicality". If you are a bronze ringer, don't assume you are totally musical in your ringing. Join in on the "Ringing Bronze Musically" class.

Percussive Techniques: Mallets, Echoes, Thumb Damps, Plucks, Marts etc. are not as easy as they look. This class will address the proper way to do these stopped sounds in ways to get a better and more musical result.

Recording your Bell Choir: John Baker has done our Festival Concert recording for the last few festivals. He has agreed to do a class on how to record YOUR bell choir. This is a great opportunity to find out some of the ins and outs of doing a recording.

Reading Sessions: We are offering reading sessions on 6 categories of music. These reading sessions will have you ringing anywhere from 10 - 15 pieces of music during a session. Join in a reading session or two in order to find some new music that your bell choir might want to add to their repertoire. This is a good opportunity for both directors and ringers.

Dividing the Beat (Simple Meter) Parts I and II: As a ringer, do you sometimes struggle with the playing of eighth note passages? Are some of those passages easier than others? This class will organize eighth notes into varying stages of "difficulty." Using original materials and standard handbell repertoire, the ringer will take a sequential journey through the wonderful world of eighth notes.

Compound Meter (6/8): When you see a piece of music in 6/8, do you count it in 6 or do you "feel it" in 2? This class will help to unravel the issues presented by compound meter. Using movement, chanting, and other strategies, ringers and directors will learn how to combine what they see on the page with the inherent flow of music in 6/8 to achieve a more musical performance.

Demystifying Changing and Asymmetric Meter: Are you confused when you ring a piece of music that changes meters? Are you intimidated when you see the time signatures 5/8, 7/8, 8/8 or 10/8? This class is designed to help both ringers and directors approach these meters in a systematic and musical way so that choirs don't have to shy away from such music. Repertoire will include some handbell "classics" and some newer repertoire using mixed and asymmetric meters.

Ways to conquer Challenging Rhythms: How do ringers and directors deal with those complex and challenging rhythms that appear on the page? Is counting the only way to understanding these issues? Is it the best way? This brain friendly class will use a variety of strategies and techniques to help master some challenging rhythm issues.

Rhythmic Ensemble across the Choir:

Treble Bell Techniques – Basic: Learn how to shelley and to ring 4-in-hand. The class is for those who have never used these techniques when ringing trebles and for ringers who have used shelley and 4 in hand but want to review the basics.

Treble Bell Techniques – more advanced: Have you ever done the travelling four-in-hand? Can you rapidly ring through passages of music using shelley and four-in-hand? Use this class to improve your skills.

What THEY see is what YOU Get! (for directors) Al Reese, director of the Virginia Handbell Consort, will work with directors in this class. Come see what he has to offer to help you have a better choir.

Working with Youth (directors only) - Ideas to share about working with youth from the minute they walk in to the last bell rung and put away. What would you like to see in your group? What has worked well? A director's sharing and collaborative discussion

You have to MOVE to ring! Loosen up, improve your coordination, add beauty to your ringing, explore creative ringing, and enhance your musicality through movement. An interactive class!

Rossetti's Rehearsal Rxemedies – Are your ringers in a rut? Do you suffer from frequent embarrassing marting? Do you want to ramp up your damp and add zing to your ring? This class explores ways to: plan effective and efficient rehearsals; get more done in your limited time; teach your ringers to watch their director and learn to play more musically, all while having fun doing it!

2013 Festival Conference Class Choices

For the 2013 SUNY Oswego Area 2 Festival Conference, we are going to try something a bit different. Each person will check off the classes he/she is interested in taking. Your selections will be noted. When you arrive at festival you will find your personal schedule on the back of your name tag. We hope that this system will ensure that those who have signed up for a class will get into that class and have a place at the ringing table.

If you just want to observe a class and not be a participant, indicate that on your sheet by placing 'observe only' before the selection.

Listed on the next page are the classes being offered.

There will be 11 class periods. Those who are ringing in a division (Tins, Coppers, or Bronze) will have a choice of 7 classes each. Those not ringing in a division will have the opportunity to take 11 classes. If you are taking a track, the number of classes you can take will be less.

In addition, any educator (registered for the Festival) who wishes to take part in the Educators' Track on Saturday may do so. You should fill out the Educator's Track registration form, but you do not have to pay the fee. It will be considered part of your festival registration and the track will be considered your class choices for the hours that it runs.

On the Class Choice Form:

- 1. Fill in your name, registration number, and the division in which you are ringing.
- Check off the classes you are interested in. Then number the classes in order of preference.
- If you are taking a Track, indicate that. You will be assigned a class time that works for your schedule
- Indicate if you want to have free time during the festival so that we will leave a class time free for you
- Class Lists will be in the classrooms. Monitors will make sure that people who are signed up for a class will have preference for ringing at the tables.

Virginia Handbell Consort (VHC) was formed in 1996 as the first community handbell ensemble in the Hampton Roads area of Virginia. Using 6 octaves of Schulmerich Bells, 5 ½ octaves of Malmark chimes and 3 octaves of Petit and Fritsen bells, VHC has performed at the John F. Kennedy Center, AGEHR Area 3 Festivals, the 50th anniversary of AGEHR and also with the Virginia Symphony.

With the help of the Virginia Commission for the Arts' Touring Assistance grants, VHC has performed across Virginia, West Virginia, Maryland, and Washington D.C. Currently under the direction of Al Reese, VHC is happy to add New York state as a destination as we continue to "Share the Joy of Ringing."

This spring, VHC goes 'On Stage' to play music from the stage and screen. From opera: the overtures from Bizet's 'Carmen' and Rossini's 'An Italian in Algiers.' 'Nessun Dorma' from Puccini's 'Turandot,' 'Meditation' from Massenet's opera *Thaïs* and 'Summertime' from Gershwin's *Porgy and Bess* will complete our trip to the opera.

The music from the legendary Henry Mancini has graced many a movie theatre; Pachelbel's 'Canon in D' has appeared in many movies! The movie *Amadeus* brought so much of Mozart's music to our ears; we'll present 'Eine Kleine Nachtmusik.' And who can forget the big bands in the movies – *The Glenn Miller Story, Orchestra Wives* and *The Benny Goodman Story* will be remembered with Al's big band arrangement titled 'Duke, Glenn and Woody.' Not to be ignored is the Broadway stage with 'Send in the Clowns' from *A Little Night Music.* The 'small screen' will be represented by 'Bronze Tango,' an original piece written by VHC's director, Al Reese, that is reminiscent of music used for an Argentine Tango on 'Dancing With the Stars.'

So, grab your tub of popcorn, your opera glasses or your 3D glasses and join VHC 'On Stage!'

VHC is our Featured Choir this year at Festival! Sounds like a great time!

Notes for Young Ringers

This summer, Oswego is the cool place to be on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 25th – 27th .

.. on the ice rink. That's right, we will actually be $On \ 1Ce$ while we are ringing. Of course, the frozen stuff will be covered with a special layer of insulation to protect it from all of us standing on it, and to protect our feet from the cold temperature.

Even though you won't need ice skates on the ringing floor, don't forget a swimming suit. There is an indoor pool on the campus that we will be able to use during our free time. And if the pool isn't big enough for you, there is Lake Ontario, all 7,430 square miles of water (that's the surface area), only a block away from the entrance to the Arena. Did you know that "Ontario"H in Iroquois means "beautiful lake?"H And with all that water nearby, evenings tend to get chilly, so don't forget to pack a sweater or sweatshirt.

Have you been practicing your bell techniques? Make sure your marts and mallets are in good shape. What about the articulation of that phrase? Or dynamics that change from section to section; even

measure to measure. Our director, Margi Zearley, is an expert **in the field** (and maybe on the ice rink?!). Make sure that you go to the Area 2 website and click on "rehearsal notes"H to find out just exactly how to prepare the pieces that we will be playing at the Festival. And if you are having any trouble with your counting, we have plenty of workshops classes to help you out.

Tell your director that your choir should make a ring of ribbons on a wristlet or attach long ribbons to the handles of your bell. We will be ringing Procession Number Four, at the beginning of the final concert and would like to make a grand entrance. Not only will the ringers sound grand but we will look grand as well.

And don't forget the fun things that happen at Young Ringers Festival - just to name a few: cup stackers, food, ice cream social, tie dye gloves, the cup game, food, minute to win it, did I mention food???? We are all looking forward to it and hope you are too. See you there!

Applications will be accepted until all sets have been allocated for Summer 2013 and the school year 2013-2014. Contact the AGEHR CHiME Chair about set availibility.

Handchime Lending Program:

The purpose of AGEHR Area 2's Handchime Lending Program is to promote the ringing of handchimes in Public or Private Elementary or Secondary schools, Churches, or Community Groups within our area of Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey and Ontario. This program is a valuable introduction to the art of ringing instruments and often becomes a focal point in expanding such programs in the local community.



About the Loan Program

AGEHR Area 2 has 9 sets of three-octave handchimes to loan.

The loan periods are:

One (1) school year (September 1 through June) with return of handchimes to Area 2 by June 15, 2014.

-OR-

One (1) summer session (July 1 – August 15) with return of handchimes to Area 2 by August 22

Eligibility Requirements

- 1. Public or Private Elementary or Secondary school, Church, or Community Group within Area 2 of AGEHR.
- 2. Handchimes will be loaned only once to a particular school, church or group.
- 3. Preference will be given to a new school district before another school within the same district.
- 4. Preference will be given to organizations with existing music programs.
- 5. Must be a member of AGEHR, or willing to become a member of AGEHR if loan is approved.

Bethany Presbyterian Church in Rochester, NY is seeking a Bell Choir Director, part time: 10 hours per week, September through May. 
